CAPACITY-BUILDING WORKSHOP

In Calabar, CYPF participated in a capacity-building workshop organized by the Coalition with support from Girls Not Brides. The workshop showcased the power of collective efforts and the need for CSOs to strengthen their interventions through collaboration. Engagements with the Cross River State Commissioner for Women Affairs yielded commitments to deepen CSO-government partnerships.





The reviewed Cross River State Child Rights Law (2023) was highlighted as a critical tool, and stakeholders stressed the need for meaningful child participation—especially for girls. CYPF remains committed to driving unified action to end child marriage across Nigeria.

CYPF SUPPORTS MENSTRUAL HYGIENE DAY OUTREACH IN GOMBE STATE

As part of our commitment to girls' empowerment and menstrual health, CYPF partnered with ADDA Girl Education Foundation to commemorate Menstrual Hygiene Day 2025 at Government Girls Science Secondary School, Kumo, Gombe State.





Through this collaboration, CYPF donated copies of the Period Diary, a resource developed by She's The First to support 25 adolescent girls in ADDA's Let's Talk Club safe space. The diary helps girls track their menstrual cycles while promoting good hygiene practices.

It also features the Global #GirlsBillofRights, written by girls for girls, affirming their right to education, equality, decision-making, and protection from exploitation. The girls were also introduced to the What Would You Do card game an engaging tool that teaches boundary-setting and healthy relationship skills through interactive, play-based learning.

CYPF remains proud to support initiatives that build girls' confidence, strengthen life skills, and ensure they grow up informed, protected, and empowered.
